ABOUT THIS MONITOR FARM

Farm name Clynelish Farm, Brora, Sutherland, KW9 6LR

Next Meeting Tuesday 30th January 2018, 11am Brora Golf Course, Brora, KW9 6QS

Clynelish Farm is a 125-hectare farm run by Jason Ballantyne and his wife Vic, in partnership with Jason's dad Murdo.

Cattle: The family runs 80 suckler cows with calves sold store at 10 months of age. Cows are all out-wintered.

Sheep: There is a flock of 900 breeding ewes, of which about half are Lairg type Cheviots and the other half Lleyn cross, currently lamb outdoors at the end of April.

Meeting Topics

The management group, made up of 6 local farmers and a local feed company rep, as well as the Jason and Victoria Ballantyne and facilitators. The group were chosen from the wider community group to ensure they are representative of the group and act as a link between the facilitators and hosts and the community group as well as using their experience to help drive the project. The management group may change throughout the life of the project.

Topics for the meetings come from the management group with the aim of being applicable to the host farm as well as the wider community group member's farms.
