



Making the most of your grass

Missed the Meeting? Here's What You Need to Know

We had a brilliant turnout at the recent Monitor Farm Scotland open meeting at Cowbog, where the focus was on **making the most of your grass in livestock systems**. For those who couldn't make it along, here's a quick roundup of the key takeaways from our speakers, **Michael Shannon** and **John Ritchie**.



Top Learnings:

- Finishing cattle and lambs on 100% forage is possible**, with a well-structured system.
- Water access and fencing** are critical to making rotational grazing work.
- Patience is key** when transitioning away from concentrates.
- Infrastructure is an investment**, it pays off in time, labour savings, and results.
- Positive mindset matters**, avoid 'busy fool' syndrome and give yourself room to learn.

John Ritchie – Grazing Specialist & Farmer at Montalt Farm, Perthshire



John shared his journey to a **more structured, rotational grazing system** that now covers 90 paddocks and supports a mix of cattle and sheep across lowland and hill ground.

- Runs **110 cows and 500 ewes** on a mix of owned and seasonal land.
- Has built a **flexible infrastructure** of fencing, water, and tracks over several years, enabling efficient grazing management year-round.
- Emphasised the role of **liming**, water access, and subdividing fields to improve **permanent pasture** without over-reliance on reseeding.

Johns Top Tips:

- Don't walk away from a negative person, run!!
- Build your networks, knowledge transfer is a powerful thing.
- Get off the farm
- Try not to be too hard on yourself when it goes wrong, because it does!
- Watch out for the "busy fool"
- Get perspective

👉 **Top takeaway:** Invest in infrastructure, understand your grass growth patterns, and **don't let water (or negativity) be your limiting factor.**




Michael Shannon – Forage-Fed Beef at Thankerton Camp Farm



Michael runs a **fully forage-based finishing system** for cattle and lambs at Thankerton Camp Farm near Biggar – and the answer to his headline question, '*Is forage enough to finish?*' was a confident yes. But, as he stressed, "**you need patience**".

- **No concentrates, no nitrogen** – just rotational grazing, red clover silage, and clever use of brassica crops like Swedes.
- Michael finishes around **150 Aberdeen Angus cattle** each year, targeting around **0.6–0.87 kg/day DLWG** – all from forage.
- Cattle are **outwintered** and moved in a system that follows grass growth closely. **No tractors in fields** during winter helps protect soil.
- Finished stock is sold **direct to customers** via www.damndelicious.co.uk, with any surplus sold deadweight.



👉 Top takeaway:

A well-planned grazing rotation and winter forage strategy can completely remove the need for hard feed – **lowering costs without sacrificing performance**.

Michaels top tip:

Instead of carrying a sward stick, just draw the lines on the side of your welly boot so they are on always to hand.





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
